NEW MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

Miss Barbara Woodberry and Mr. Anthony Austin have been elected to the Council in the first election by the graduates of the University.

Miss Woodberry, who attended Presentation Convent, Windsor, is a Bachelor of Science. She was a foundation member of the Students Representative Council, the Newman Society, Science Faculty Association and Fencing Club, and is the S.R.C.'s representative on the Victorian Women's Graduates Association. Miss Woodberry has been elected to Council for a period of two years.

Mr. Austin, a former student of Melbourne High School, is a Bachelor of Arts. He was a member of the foundation committee of the Monash Labour Club, established the Hockey Club of which he is President, was Treasurer of the Sports Association for two years and is a Vice-President. Mr. Austin has been elected to Council for a period of four years.

Both Miss Woodberry and Mr. Austin were among the first graduates of the University and are at present studying for their Diploma in Education.

HONOURS AND DISTINCTIONS

Professor R.R. Andrew (Medicine) was appointed to the Council of the Victorian Branch of the Australian Medical Association in July this year.

Professor B.P. Marmion (Microbiology) has been awarded a D.Sc. by the University of London for published work on the rickettsial and the pleuro-pneumonia group of micro-organisms.

Professor D.H. Monro (Philosophy) has been elected a member of the Social Science Research Council of Australia.

CHAIR OF LINGUISTICS

Dr. U.G.E. Hammarström has been appointed to the Chair of Linguistics.

Dr. Hammarström is at present Docent and Examiner in Phonetics in the old-established Swedish University of Uppsala and has directed the Phonetics Department since 1956.

CHAIR OF LINGUISTICS (cont.)

He is a member of the Committee of the International Society of Phonetic Sciences, Dr. Hammarström has held appointments as Acting Professor and Director of Studies in Romance Languages in the University of Uppsala and as Acting Professor and Director of Studies in Phonetics in the University of Bonn. He has lectured in the Universities of Strasbourg, Cologne and Frankfurt and has engaged in research in the Phonetics Departments of the Universities of Paris, Strasbourg, Bonn, Edinburgh and the Associacao Academica de Coimbra (Portugal).

In addition to phonetics his main interests are in general and applied linguistics, dialectology, experimental phonetics and Romance Languages, especially Portuguese and French.

Dr. Hammarström is very interested to investigate in Australia the fascinating mixture of languages that has resulted from the immigration programme and will apply the most modern methods of phonetic research to the language problems of New Australians.

Dr. Hammarström who is married with two children will take up his appointment early in 1965.

STAFF ARRIVALS - OCTOBER

Dr. D.R. Blackman - Lecturer in Mechanical Engineering - graduated B.Mech.E. in 1957 and M.Eng.Sc. in 1960 from the University of Melbourne where from 1958-1960 he held an Assistant Lectureship in the Department of Mechanical Engineering. He spent the last three years at the University of Southampton as a Research Assistant working on boundary layer phenomena. He gained his Ph.D. on this work. Dr. Blackman is married with two children.

Dr. J.R.L. Forsyth - Lecturer in Microbiology - graduated M.B., Ch.B. from the University of Cape Town in 1954 and in 1959 he obtained the Academic Postgraduate Diploma in Bacteriology from the University of London.

After working for one year as a House Surgeon and Physician at the Groote Schuur Hospital he worked for three years as a Registrar in the Department of Pathology at the University of Cape Town. In 1958 he accepted an appointment in the Department of Microbiology at the Queen's University of Belfast. He resigned from a Lectureship in this Department to take up his appointment at Monash. Dr. Forsyth is single.

Dr. B.J. Smith - Lecturer in Zoology and Comparative Physiology - After graduating B.Sc. (Hons.) from the University College of North Wales in 1961, Dr. Smith accepted a research studentship in the Department of Zoology at the same University College, where he has recently completed the requirements for a Ph.D. His doctoral thesis is entitled 'An investigation of certain glandular changes associated with the reproductive cycle of the slug, *Arion ater*.'

While a research student, Dr. Smith conducted both tutorials and demonstrations to undergraduates. He has had two papers published in scientific journals. Dr. Smith is married.

Mr. L.E. Ward - Temporary Fellow in Economics - graduated B.Sc. (Agric.) from the University of Western Australia in 1956. From 1957-1961 while operating a family orchard property at Kelmscott he attended the same University as a part-time student, graduating B.A. in Economics in 1961. Mr. Ward will take part in a comprehensive enquiry, supervised by Professor Gruen, into the long term development of Australia's future exportable supplies of a range of agricultural products. DEPARTMENTAL NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

ANATOMY

Dr. G. Fink, Lecturer in the Department, has been awarded a Nuffield Dominions Demonstratorship at Oxford University, and will leave in December to continue a programme of neuroendocrinological research at the Department of Human Anatomy for two years.

Dr. A.S. Wilson, Senior Lecturer in the Department, will leave for University College, Dundee, in December, on study leave to carry out neurohistochemical studies on the peripheral nervous system.

Dr. Elizabeth Shanahan, Dr. J.A.L. Hart, Dr. T. Mandel and Dr. P.J. Paterson were successful in completing the September Primary Examination for the Diploma of Fellowship of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons. Dr. G.C. Smith was successful in the examination in basic medical sciences for the Diploma of Psychological Medicine.

APPLIED MECHANICS

A number of sessions in the Engineering Research Colloquium Series have been presented in recent months by outside speakers and Monash staff.

In late June, Professor W.H. Wittrick of the Department of Aeronautics, Sydney University, spoke on surge propagation in helical springs. In July two sessions were held: Dr. D.C. Stevenson of Monash discussed his recent work on the development of a random load fatigue testing machine. The subject of the second session was Very High Magnetic Fields, presented by Dr. N. Kurti, F.R.S., of the Clarendon Laboratory and presently a Visiting Scientist in the Department of Physics at Monash.

In a subsequent session, Dr. L.C. Woods also of Oxford (Balliol), spoke of his work on Magneto-hydrodynamic waves; he is now visiting Professor in the Department of Applied Mathematics and in the School of Engineering.

Early in August, Dr. A.E. Billington of the Aeronautical Research Laboratories was guest speaker in a session where he described his theories of the flutter of a submerged body.

In October, Professor F.H. Gruen of Monash was speaker at a session on Productivity and Technical Change where he discussed the tools available to the economist examining problems of technical change.

CHEMISTRY

Dr. M.L. Heffernan will be away from the Department on seven months study leave during 1965. He will be spending most of his time studying recent developments in high resolution nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy at the Department of Chemistry, Harvard University. He hopes to also visit laboratories carrying out similar research in Britain and Sweden.

Dr. I.R. Wilson is on study leave for twelve months from this month. Dr. Wilson will spend most of his time at Dyson Perrins Laboratory at Oxford with Dr. W.A. Waters. He will examine the rates of formation and destruction of some radical species which arise in the oxidation of fairly simple compounds of nitrogen. He will also visit several places in Britain, Israel and United States of America which are carrying on research closely related to the work of this Department.

A lecture was given by Dr. F.W. Eastwood to the Institute of Chemistry on 'Progress in Carbene Chemistry'.

Research Seminars have been given by: Professor W.F. Pickering, Chemistry Department, Newcastle University College, N.S.W., 'Equilibrium Studies Involving Solid-Liquid Systems'; Dr. T.P. Cotter, Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, U.S.A. 'Nuclear Rocket Propulsion Research'; Professor H.C. Clark, University of British Columbia, British Columbia, Canada. Topic was related to fluoro-organometallic chemistry. Dr. R.S. Dickson, Department of Chemistry, Monash University, 'Perfluoro-acetylene Complexes of Transition Metals'; Professor L.M. Jackman, Department of Chemistry, University of Melbourne, 'The Chemistry of Chorismic Acid'; Dr. M.L. Heffernan, Department of Chemistry, Monash University, 'Interpretation of Proton Magnetic Resonance Spectra'.

ENGLISH

Mr. David Bradley will spend twelve months study leave in London working at the British Museum.

HISTORY

Dr. Ian Macdonald, Medical Counsellor, and Mr. George Cally, Student Adviser, visited the Department on Wednesday afternoon, 14th October, to discuss and answer questions about their work in the University, and to talk over the role of staff in counselling students. This discussion was attended by most members of the Department and proved most valuable.

LAW

On Thursday, 1st October, the Law Students' Society invited Mr. G.H. Lush, Q.C., to deliver a lunch-time address to law students on the subject of "Life at the Bar" and the role of barristers in the legal profession. Mr. Lush is the President of the Victorian Bar Council and one of the leading silks at the Victorian Bar.

The Dean invited Mr. Eugene Gorman, Q.C., a former leading advocate of the Victorian Bar, to deliver a series of lectures to Monash law students on the topic of the lives of well-known common law advocates.

DEPARTMENTAL NEWS (cont.)

By arrangement with the Law Institute of Victoria the lectures were delivered on Monday evenings at 8.15 p.m. in the Law Institute library, commencing on Monday, 14th September and concluding on Monday 12th October. Interested law students from Melbourne University and members of the profession were also invited to attend these lectures. Attendance was very good and all those present were delighted with Mr. Gorman's eloquent and entertaining treatment of his subject. The titles of the lectures were as follows:

Howe and Hummel - Crooked as the Horns of a Dorset Ram.
Erskine and His Times - The Advocate who Excelled Cicero.
Curran, John Philpot - And His Treacherous Junior.
Darrow - An Advocate with a Social Conscience
General Aspects of Advocacy.

The final lecture in the series was delivered at the University on Monday 12th October after which Mr. Gorman was entertained at lunch with members of staff of the Law School.

MATHEMATICS

During third term first-year students taking Mathematics were used as guinea pigs in a controlled experiment in programmed instruction. The performance of students attending normal lectures over a period of two weeks is now being compared with the performance of the remainder learning from programmed material. The experiment is being supervised by Dr. M. Balson of the Department of Education. The programmed material was prepared by Dr. Laszlo.

A lecture was given recently by Dr. Rene Van der Borgh, Associate Professor of Applied Mathematics, School of General Studies, Australian National University and a visit is expected shortly from Professor P.F. Conrad, Fulbright Scholar visiting A.N.U.

MEDICINE

Dr. Kate Campbell, consultant on children's diseases at the Queen Victoria and Royal Women's Hospitals, shared the first £5,000 Britannica-Australian Award in Medicine, awarded on Monday, 19th October.

Professor H.A.F. Dudley, Department of Surgery, Alfred Hospital, is overseas from 17th October to the 9th December, visiting Singapore, Scotland, England and United States of America.

Dr. A.W. Linnane, Department of Biochemistry, will be overseas from 3rd to the 17th November at a Conference on Cell Biology in Cleveland, United States of America.

PHILOSOPHY

Professor Cal Rollins, Oberlin College, United States of America, who is working temporarily at the Australian National University, visited Monash, and gave two lectures to students, 'Survival after Death' and 'Relativism in Ethics', and read a paper to the Staff Seminar.

Dr. Y. Chopra will be on study leave in Oxford during part of 1965. He is to read a paper, 'The Consequences of Human Actions', to the Aristotelean Society in London in February.

Various members of staff have been presenting an Adult Education series at Monash entitled 'Man and Materialism', with the assistance of members of other departments.

UNION

The Warden of the Union and the Union Office have now been moved over to their new offices in the Union - ground floor.

Red Cross - The Blood Bank visited Monash on Tuesday, September 22nd. They wish to convey their thanks to the one hundred and forty volunteers.

Monash University Ski Hut - The Sports Association is proposing to build a multi-purpose lodge at Mt. Bulla during the 1965-66 long vacation. The planning envisages the use of this hut by skiers in the winter season and bush walkers at other times. It will also be available, in summer and autumn, for small groups wishing to use it for conferences. Although the Sports Association is allocating some £7,000 - £8,000 for this venture, it will be necessary to have the assistance of some voluntary labour. It is hoped that this will be a combined staff and student venture. SYDNEY HOUSE TO LET

Dr. R. Ian Jack of Sydney University has advised that his home will be available for rental at £10 per week from 16th January to 28th February, 1965. RELIGIOUS CENTRE

The Religious Centre in the University was opened in June 1962 in the Red Cross building of the old Talbot Colony. Redecoration was carried out by students and Chaplains with the assistance of members of the Maintenance staff. The first service was held in the interdenominational Chapel on June 29th.

During the past two and a half years over eight hundred services, denominational and interdenominational, have been attended by close on eleven thousand members of the University. The Common room, Chapel and even the kitchen have been pressed into use for prayermeetings and discussion groups. A feature of the Common room has been the almost continuous open forum on all matters concerning the place and responsibilities of the Churches in the University and in daily life.

The Chaplains, Anglican, Roman Catholic and Jewish, have been regularly consulted by believers and non-believers alike, on the problems and difficulties facing students in the University, and have endeavoured to guide their respective religious societies toward a practical application of their faith in university surroundings.

FACULTY CLUB

Complaints are rife about the length of time which has passed without any progress towards opening the Faculty Club bar. This happy event depends on the grant of a club licence, which in turn depends on the pleasure of the Licensing Court. Currently the waiting list for hearings is believed to be over twelve months. The President and the Secretary have recently been in touch with the University's solicitors, and have grounds for hoping - though not for promising - that our hearing will take place by the middle of 1965. Should our application be successful, and the bar come into operation, we may then hope to increase the Club's amenities.
