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MEMBERSHIP OF THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL

Mr. G.H. Thomas, M.I.E.S. (Aust.) has been appointed a member of the Council for four years to 2nd July 1971 under Section 7(1)(a)(iv) of the Act, representing the Technical Schools in the Metropolitan Area.

The following members, whose previous terms of office expired on 2nd July 1967, have been re-appointed or re-elected for four years to 2nd July 1971:

Mr. J.W. Wood - Act 7(1)(a)(ii) - representing Industrial and Commercial Interests.

Mr. E.J. Tippet - Act 7(1)(a)(v) - representing Technical Schools outside the Metropolitan Area.

Dr. T.E. Lowe - Act 7(1)(c) - representing the Faculty of Medicine.

Dr. F.G. Lennox - Act 7(1)(c) - representing the Faculty of Science.

Professor D. Cochrane - Act 7(1)(d) - representing the professors.

Professor J.D. Legge - Act 7(1)(d) - representing the professors.

Dr. I.D. Hiscock - Act 7(1)(e) - representing teaching staff other than professors.

Mr. J.H. Price, formerly Student Observer on the Council, has been elected by the students as a member of Council for four years from 23rd June 1967 - Act 7(2)(a).

CHAIR OF FRENCH

Dr. Ivan Barko has been appointed to one of the two available Chairs in French. Dr. Barko, who is at present Reader in French at the University of Melbourne, is expected to take up his new appointment in December this year.

He obtained a "Licence en Philologie romane, avec distinction" from the University of Brussels in 1954 and gained a "Doctorat de l'Universite de Strasbourg, mention tres honorable, a l'unanimité du jury, avec eloges" from the University of Strasbourg in 1956. Dr. Barko is Chairman of the French Standing Committee of the Victorian Universities and Schools Examinations Board.

He has carried out research into late nineteenth and early twentieth century French literature and thought and is currently engaged in work on seventeenth century French literature and special reference to symbolism, structural patterns and bibliographical problems in Racine's drama.

Dr. Barko is married with three children.

CHAIR OF ENGINEERING DYNAMICS

Mr. J.D.C. Crisp has been appointed to the Chair of Engineering Dynamics. Professor Crisp was formerly Associate Professor in the department of Mechanical Engineering at Monash.

Professor Crisp is a graduate of the University of Adelaide. His research and teaching interests lie in the dynamics of mechanical systems.

Before his appointment to the staff at Monash in 1961, Professor Crisp was Research Associate Professor of Applied Mechanics in the Department of Aeronautical Engineering and Applied Mechanics at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, New York where his research interest centred on the dynamic problems associated with the re-entry

of space vehicles. He has also worked at the Aeroelastic and Structures Research Laboratory, Department of Aeronautics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston, the Aeronautical Research Laboratories, Melbourne, Vickers-Armstrongs Limited, Weybridge, and the Royal Aircraft Establishment, at Farnborough, U.K. where he carried out research into the structural dynamic problem of missiles and high speed aircraft.

Professor Crisp is married with three children.

VISITING PROFESSOR IN RUSSIAN

Dr. Rudolph Zimek has been appointed to a Visiting Professorship in the Russian Section of the department of Modern Languages. The appointment is for a period of fifteen months.

Dr. Zimek is a graduate of the Universities of Prague and Olomouc in Czechoslovakia, majoring in English and Russian. He is at present Head of the Department of Slavonic Studies and Vice-Dean of the Faculty of Arts at Olomouc.

He has had considerable teaching experience and has made valuable contributions to recent developments in the fields of General and Slavonic Linguistics. He will be especially welcome as a contributor to the rapidly developing linguistics research programme in which his colleagues from various Sections of the Department of Modern Languages are now engaged.

Dr. Zimek is expected to arrive in Melbourne in September this year.

ANTHROPOLOGY AND SOCIOLOGY

Two very fine collections of artefacts from the New Hebrides have been donated to the department. One collection of forty-eight items was given by the Misses Leggatt, daughters of the Rev. T. Watt Leggatt, who went to the New Hebrides in 1886 as a Presbyterian missionary. The other, of over two hundred items, was donated by Miss K.M. Alexander, the daughter of the Rev. W.W. Alexander, who visited the various Missions in the New Hebrides in the 1900's.

FACULTY OF EDUCATION

Professor S.S. Dunn has just returned from five weeks overseas. The main purpose of the trip was to present three papers to an international workshop on "The Possibilities and Limitations of Educational Testing" held in Berlin, May 16th to 24th. Organized by Pädagogisches Zentrum and sponsored by the Ford Foundation, the workshop was attended by about 100 participants and observers from 24 countries.

On the way to and from the conference Professor Dunn conferred with colleagues at Hong Kong, Jerusalem, Stockholm, Manchester, London, Cambridge, U.S.A. (Harvard), Ontario, Toledo, Urbana (Illinois) and Palo Alto (Stanford).

At a recent Conference of the Australian Council for Educational Research papers were presented by Professor R. Selby Smith (Current Resources and their effective use in Australia) and by Mr. R. McCulloch, Senior Lecturer in Education (School Organization).

Dr. G.M. Kellerman - Associate Professor in Biochemistry - graduated B.Sc. (1947), M.Sc. (1948), M.B., B.S. (1951), at the University of Sydney. Dr. Kellerman spent two years as National Health Medical Research Council Research Fellow at Sydney University, followed by periods as Nuffield Foundation Travelling Fellow at King's College Hospital, London, and Rockefeller Foundation Travelling Fellow in New York. He returned to take up an N.H.M.R.C. Senior Research Fellowship at Sydney in 1958 and was appointed Senior Lecturer there in 1959. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 1966. Dr. Kellerman's chief research interests are in the metabolism of fatty acids in the mammal. He has had several articles published. Dr. Kellerman is married.

Mr. L.P. Harris - Senior Lecturer in Music - graduated B.A. (Canterbury) 1952, B.Mus. (Otago) in 1954; following his second degree, Mr. Harris took up an appointment as Assistant Lecturer at Otago and remained there until 1965: he was then Senior Lecturer. In 1965 Mr. Harris took an appointment as Lecturer in Music at the University of Western Australia. His special research interests lie mainly in mid 18th century changes in musical style, the music of the early classical period, and, in particular, the works of Joseph Haydn.
